GRAND TRAVERSE YACHT CLUB 2013 WEDNESDAY NIGHT SERIES SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- **1. RULES** The series will be governed by The Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS), the prescriptions of the United States Sailing Association (USSA), and the rules of the PHRF class (as administered by LMPHRF), except as any of these are changed by these sailing instructions. The series is designated Catergory A.
- 1.1 A boat may take a One-Turn Penalty, consisting of one tack and one gybe, when she may have broken a rule of Part 2, Rule 31, or Rule 42 while racing.
- **2. ENTRIES** Eligible boats may be entered by completing registration with the Grand Traverse Yacht Club (GTYC) and paying all applicable race fees <u>prior</u> to racing.
- **3. NOTICES TO COMPETITORS** Will be posted on the official **Fleet Race Notice Board** located at the GTYC Clubhouse inside the main entrance.
- **4. CHANGES IN SAILING INSTRUCTIONS** Any change in the sailing instructions will be posted before 1700 hrs on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 1200 hrs on the day before it will take effect. These posted changes may also be communicated to the competitors on the water over VHF Channel 69 prior to the 1st warning. The RC boat will display Code Flag "L" when a change has been posted and is to be communicated.
- SIGNALS MADE ASHORE Will be displayed from the GTYC flagstaff and will be communicated to competitors over VHF Channel 69. If you have any question regarding the status of a race, call the Race Committee @ 218-3700.

6. SCHEDULE OF RACES

7. THE COURSE

- 7.1 Course sheets for the race, all of which will take place in the South portion of West Grand Traverse Bay, are provided on <u>Attachment A</u>.
- 7.2 The course selection will be displayed from the RC Boat no later than one (1) minute before the 1st warning signal.
- 7.3 The RC may also select a course not found in Attachment A by displaying Code Flag L : , with the course and announcing it on VHF Channel 69.

8. THE START

8.1 All sections will consist of spinnaker and JAM boats, each racing under their spinnaker or nonspinnaker LM-PHRF Handicap respectively.

Experienced – This section is for skippers and crews who are fully experienced with racing their boat.

Development – This section is for skippers and crews who have had some experience racing and are developing further expertise. This section is meant for those developing crews where either the skipper or a significant number of the crew has little experience racing a PHRF boat.

Discover Racing – This section is for skippers and crews who are either beginning racing or who have had some experience racing and are developing further expertise, e.i. crews where either the skipper or a significant number of the crew has little experience racing a PHRF boat or are racing spinnaker for the first time.

All sections will consist of spinnaker and JAM boats, each racing under their spinnaker or nonspinnaker LM-PHRF rating respectively. At the end of each series the Race Committee will evaluate each of the two top finishers in the Development & Discover Sailing sections and may, at their option, require the boat to move to a another section. The bottom two finishers in the Expert and Development Sections may, at their choice, move to the Development or Discover Sailing sections for the next series.

In the event of excessive boats in a single section, that class will be split by PHRF ratings.

8.2 Races will be started using rule 26, utilizing the following class flags and sequences (<u>Also see</u> <u>Attachment B</u>):



- 8.3 The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag or shape on the RC Boat and the course side of the starting mark for the course. The position of the RC Boat will depend on water depth around the start mark (i.e., the line may be reversed).
- 8.4 Boats whose preparatory signal has not been made shall keep clear of the starting area and of all boats whose preparatory signal has been made.

9. RECALLS

- 9.1. If an Individual Recall has been signalled, the RC will attempt to notify On Course Side (OCS) competitors over VHF Channel 69 or by hail.
- 9.2. If a General Recall is signalled, the starting sequence for any subsequent classes will not be affected and the start for the recalled class will be after the last regularly scheduled class. This changes RRS 29.2.

10. THE FINISH

- 10.1 The finishing line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag or shape on the RC Boat and the course side of the nearby mark of the course. The position of the RC Boat will depend on water depth around the finish mark (i.e., the line may be reversed).
- 10.2 The RC will remain on station at the finish until the time limit unless conditions dictate otherwise. If the RC is not on station, competitors shall take their own time when their bow crosses a line through the finish mark that is perpendicular to the last leg of the race and they are within 50 yds of the mark.
- **11. TIME LIMIT** Will be two and one-half (2 1/2) hours. Boats failing to finish within one (1) hour after the first boat in her class, but still racing, will be scored "Time Limit Failure" (TLF) and will receive one (1) more point than the last boat to finish. This changes RRS 35.

12. PROTESTS

12.1 Protests shall be written on forms available on the Fleet Official Notice Board and delivered to the Race Committee Chair within Protest Time which will begin when the RC Boat docks and end one (1) hour later.

- 12.2 Protests will be heard in approximately the order of receipt as soon as practical, but not necessarily the night of the event.
- 12.3 Protest notices will be posted within 30 minutes of the protest time limit to inform competitors of the time and location of a hearing in which they are parties to or named as witnesses.

13. GROSS MISCONDUCT

- 13.1 Verbal abuse of the RC and/or Protest Committee will be considered an act of Gross Misconduct.
- 13.2 When a competitor and/or crew is found to have committed an act of Gross Misconduct, the penalty shall be a scoring penalty equal to 40% of the entries in the race for each incident. Additionally, the competitor and/or boat that was responsible for the crew may not discard this race in the series.

14. MEASUREMENT AND RATING

- 14.1 All competitors will use, or be assigned, PHRF Handicaps. For those participants who, at the time of registration, provide a LMPHRF certificate no older than two years and which still accurately represents the vessel's current configuration, their assigned rating will be as listed on the certificate (Spinnaker or Non-Spinnaker). All other participants will be assigned a rating at the Race Committee's discretion.
- 14.2 One Design yachts shall be sailed according to their one design class rules in order to recieve the PHRF rating accorded to their design by LMPHRF.

15. SCORING

- 15.1 The Low Point scoring system, RRS Appendix A, will apply, except as modified below.
- 15.2 For the Spring and Fall Series, all races completed will count towards the series.
- 15.3 For the Summer and Twilight Series, 4 of the races completed will count towards the series.
- 15.4 To be scored overall for a Wednesday Night Series, a boat must compete in at least one half of the races completed in the series (number of races will be rounded up to the nearest whole number).
- **16. SAFETY** Competitors who withdraw from a race shall notify the RC over VHF Channel 69.
- **17. RADIO COMMUNICATION** A boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communications not available to all boats. VHF Channel 69 will be monitored by the RC and they will only respond to competitors who identify themselves.
- **18. PRIZES** Will be awarded at the Club after each race at the direction of the RC and will be based on prizes available, but remember . . . **YOU MUST BE PRESENT TO WIN!!!** Series awards will be presented at the Annual GTYC Awards Banquet.
